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Human Service Transportation Coordination State Profile: TEXAS

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In a state with vast geography, a growing population and differing needs of rural and urban areas, coordinating transportation services in Texas has proven to be a challenge. 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State Activity

Busy First Quarter

With legislative sessions in full swing, the first quarter of 2012 saw a lively mix of state legislation related to human service transportation coordination.

- A Florida measure was sent to the governor for approval on April 6 that would allocate \$10 million to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund in FY 2013 and each year thereafter. The funds would subsidize transportation costs for those who, due to physical or mental disability, income status or age, cannot transport themselves and are dependent upon others to access life-sustaining activities.
- The Idaho Senate approved <u>legislation</u> on Feb. 21 to create the Idaho Mobility Council. The council would advise the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) on issues, coordination strategies, policies, procedures and funding relating to mobility planning and implementation and provide leadership for planning and coordination, among other duties.
- A measure became law on March 20 In Indiana that requires the state Department of Health, the Division of Fire and Building Safety, and the Indiana Emergency Medical Services Commission to report to the Health Finance Commission on various services, including procedures and policies for health facilities to obtain emergency and nonemergency medical transportation services.
- A bill signed into law on March 30 in Maine directs the state Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to review reimbursement for transportation for MaineCare members to and from services, including but not limited to freestanding methadone treatment clinics. Among other tasks, DHHS is required to review options for limiting allowable reimbursement and for coordinating transportation services to decrease costs.

- In New York, a pending <u>bill</u> would refer responsibilities of the Interagency Coordinating Committee on Rural Public Transportation to the New York State Department of Transportation. The DOT would consult with various state agencies and other human service and transportation stakeholders, and recommend policies to promote coordination, efficiency and transportation access.
- An <u>act</u> signed by **Vermont**'s governor on April 4 directs the Commissioner of Mental Health to implement a clinical resource management system which includes coordinated transportation services.
- A pending measure in Washington would change the composition and duties of the Agency Council on Coordinated Transportation (ACCT). The bill would expand council membership; extend the council beyond June 30, 2012; limit the support provided to the ACCT; and place the council's focus on projects involving coordinated human services transportation plans, mobility management and underserved populations, among others.

Alaska's Task Force Releases Coordination Report

In January, the Alaska Governor's Coordinated Transportation Task Force (CTTF) released a draft final report. Created by executive order, the CTTF serves as the advisory committee to the Governor concerning community-based transportation services and coordination. The report contains a statewide vision for human service public transportation and an action plan with outcome-based strategies. Recommendations include legislatively creating a state Coordinated Transportation Commission with the authority and responsibility to make needed systemic changes.

Surface Transportation Extension Passes House

On April 18, the U.S. House of Representatives approved the Surface Transportation Extension Act of 2012, Part II (H.R. 4348), which extends surface transportation authorization and current funding levels for transit and highway programs through Sept. 30, 2012. Although the administration has issued a veto threat against the bill, the House vote now allows formal conference negotiations with the Senate over more long-term legislation—and how to save the Highway Trust Fund from insolvency. While it is uncertain what elements of existing Senate and House proposals will make it into a long-term bill, both sides have expressed support for continued, dedicated transit funding.

More Spending Flexibility for Transit Agencies

Transit agencies nationwide have been granted a one-time opportunity to cover fuel costs with a portion of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds normally allocated for capital expenses. FTA Administrator Peter Rogoff commented that the "flexibility brings short-term relief to the nation's cash-strapped transit agencies and keep buses and trains running for the riders who depend on them." Included in President Obama's proposed FY2013 budget is an additional chance for urban area transit agencies to use federal capital funds for operating expenses such as fuel. The budget would allow for assistance over a three-year period if the economy were to decline. Read more in the April 12 Federal Register and this news release from FTA.

\$40 Million Available for Local and Tribal Transit Options

The U.S. Department of Transportation has announced new grant funds for communities and tribal governments to plan and strengthen public transit. On March 9, U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood announced \$15 million to be awarded through the Tribal Transit Program, to improve transit access to jobs, education, medical services and other needs in underserved rural areas. Proposals are due by May 10, 2012. On March 12, LaHood announced a further \$25 million through the Alternative Analysis competitive grant program to help communities plan future transit options, with proposals due by April 19.
