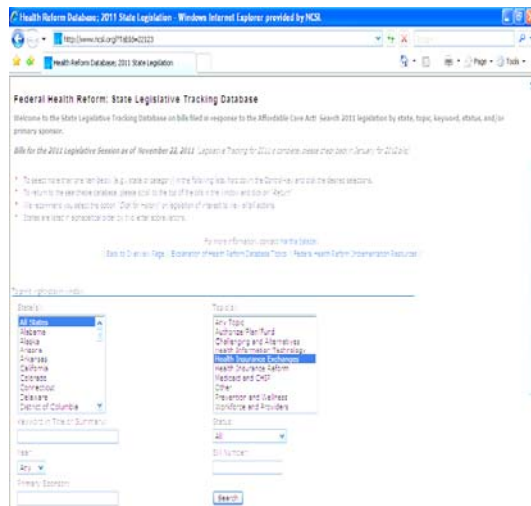


NCSL Tracking State Actions Addressing Federal Health Reform

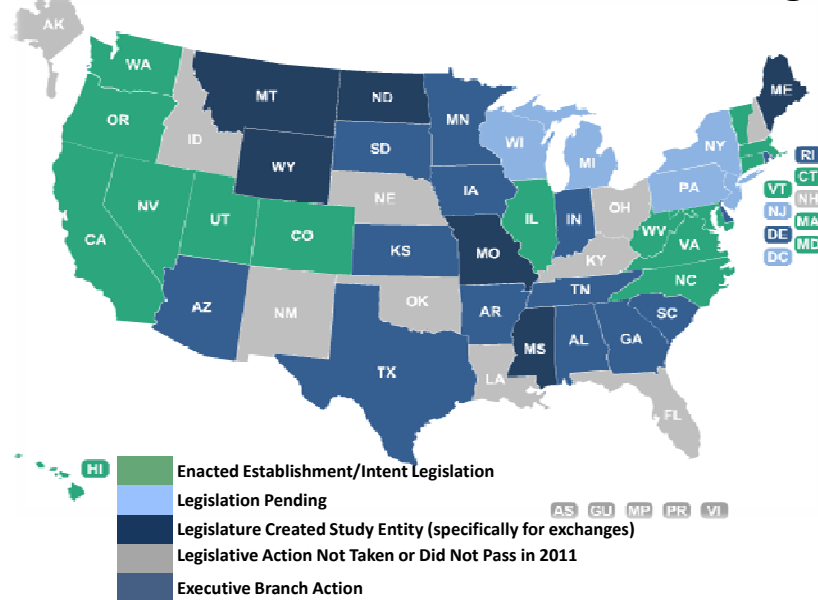


Federal Health Reform Legislative Tracking Database --2011 Summary

- At least 917 bills in all 50 states were introduced in 2011
- The bills addressed a variety of topics in the federal health reform law
- Legislative Tracking will continue in 2012
- The database is used to populate provision specific web pages.
