The initiative addressed duplicative systems and resources and has resulted in an estimated reduced spending and projected savings of \$372 million. The center was formed in May 2016, when Governor Hickenlooper signed H.B. 1453, establishing the NCC as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. The center helps organizations being targeted by hackers or digital criminals, and it also provides proactive cybersecurity measures to protect individuals and organizations from being attacked in the first place.
