Even so, cybersecurity is a concern. Who’s responsible for security? How does that responsibility dovetail with legal requirements for independent voting for people with disabilities and for ballot secrecy? Is the data in our voter registration systems safe? How do we use technology to help military and overseas voters get their ballots back in time to be counted? When is it time to buy the next generation of elections technology, and how will it be secured? Don’t expect easy answers—do expect to get a few more pieces to this complex policy puzzle.</p>
